





APRU is the international organization of leading research universities in the Asia-Pacific region



Here comes a good example of collaboration on global health education development: the Association of Pacific Rim Universities (60), formed in 1997, consisting of 45 leading research universities, from countries such as Australia, Canada, Chile, China, Russia, the US, and so on, aiming to foster education, research, and enterprise in the Pacific Rim. From 2012, APRU has embarked on a new strategic framework including creating Asia-Pacific Global Leaders. APRU universities will cooperate to enhance the global leadership capabilities of faculty, administrators, and students, as well as of their institutions.

The Graduate School of Public Health, Yonsei University, Seoul, Republic of Korea



Founded in 1977, the Graduate School of Public Health at Yonsei University has taken long strides as an institute for public health education since its foundation. The first dean of the School was Dr. Jaemo Yang, with 20 students at that time. Now it boasts 350 students, of whom 300 are enrolled in the M.P.H. degree and 50 in the Health Executive Program. Under the leadership of Dean Jae Hoon Roh, M.D., Ph.D., the School currently has 20 full-time faculty members. It offers master's degree in 10 public health concentrations including hospital administration, health policy & management, global health, public health laws and ethics, epidemiology, health promotion & education, biostatistics, health informatics, occupational health, and environmental health.
